“When my father returned to the site the next day, he was impressed with the craftsmanship and asked who had done the work.” Ryan’s skills were rewarded; he was promoted to a position as a carpenter’s assistant where he continued to study the art of building homes, and to prove his mettle.

Ryan says. “That was a turning point for me. That’s when I decided to be a General Contractor.”





